United we stand

From the Rectory

In my previous life I was a geography teacher, and I used to enjoy looking at how the rotation and tilt of the earth combine to give precise dates to the seasons. But rather than making things clear – this actually complicates them.

And that's because the more common way of dating seasons is in terms of the lunar rather than the astronomical cycle. The result is that there are two official dates for the beginning of each one.

'Astronomical Spring' begins on 20th March (the vernal equinox – when the midday day is vertically overhead at the equator). Whilst *'Meteorological Spring'* begins on 1st March (the result of splitting the year into four equal parts).

Most people probably go for the latter – which is particularly appropriate this year, as that's also Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent.

The word 'Lent' comes from *'lencten'* (old English for 'spring'; and close to *'lenz'*, which is German for 'spring').

And this is always a bit of a problem. Because spring is a time of new growth, a time when the days are getting noticeably longer (something they've actually been doing since the winter solstice, on 21st December), a time of looking forward to warmer and brighter weather.

But it's also the time when the Church traditionally gets into hair-shirt mode. So whilst the world in general is on the up – the Church in most people's eyes goes all gloomy.

The old idea of wearing sackcloth and covering yourself in ashes, as a way of expressing repentance – has gone. Its only remaining vestige is the practice of 'ashing' on Ash Wednesday, when (some) Christians receive the sign of the cross in ash on their foreheads.

Lent itself passes most people by completely. Some get involved in a study course of some kind – but it's instructive the way these often happen only at this time of year (as it gives the impression they're done as a penance – rather than part of normal life).

But despite all that – Lent has a lot to commend it. A time when we're encouraged to take stock, to reflect – and to ask questions. A time when we're encouraged to take religion a bit more seriously than normal. Not being preciously pious about it – but thinking more deeply about the way our faith informs our life.

It's therefore a particularly good opportunity for those who have no time (in any sense) for religion – to make space to try and engage with it (and that includes looking at the reasons why they've *not* been able to engage with it – and see if there could be any ways in which they *might* be able to engage with it).

A 'good Lent' should find us approaching Easter rather differently to how we approached Ash Wednesday. Because that would show we've grown in some way, that our understanding of ourselves and our faith has been increased – and that we've come to realise just how little we know about the Mystery at the very heart of absolutely everything.

There are two different ways of understanding spring – but an almost unlimited number of ways of understanding God. Much of my time is spent trying to convince people that the Sunday School understanding of God they once had – is not fit for purpose in the adult world.

Which means (of course) that any *rejection* of God based on such a Sunday School understanding – is *also* not fit for purpose!

And that the whole subject of God is something that mature and intelligent human beings, not only *can* get involved in – but *should* get involved in.

God is the name/label we give to all that is most profound, all that is most important, all that is most worthwhile in human life. And because we all ought to be taking such things as seriously as we possibly can – the subject matter of religion is of the greatest significance to absolutely everyone.

These (and other) matters will be chewed over in the Lent courses I'm running in the benefice – and if you'd like to know more (or are simply curious) just drop in. There will be no pressure to say anything – but if you'd like to, that will be most welcome!

IN2 the Bible 2017 LENT CHALLENGE

You may remember that in 2016 we set you a challenge to speak out, to share your faith stories with others. In 2017 we want to build on that as we journey IN as part of our Way of Life.


One of the great prayers of the Church of England notes that God “caused holy Scripture to be written for our learning”, and asks God to help us to “hear, read, mark, learn and inwardly digest” them. The prayer asks this so that through patience, and the comfort of the word, we might embrace and hold fast to the hope of everlasting life.

That prayer was written by an archbishop four hundred years ago, but it is our prayer today, and is the heart of our challenge to you this Lent.

Simply put, we are encouraging you and challenging you to see that reading the Bible is a familiar and everyday part of our Christian journey together. That word “together” is important, discipleship is a journey taken in company, so the challenge is to read the Bible together, with another person or two this Lent. To read, mark, learn and maybe even inwardly digest Scripture together.

If we were asking you to have a cup of tea with someone this Lent, or even a meal, that would be an easy challenge, this is a challenge to share the feast of scripture with another person and for this to start becoming a normal part of our journey together. Just as the inward digesting of a shared meal takes place with conversation as well as calories, so we want to encourage conversation about the Bible. A conversation that includes questions like what does this mean to me? How does God speak in this passage? How am I comforted or dis-comforted? Where is the everlasting hope?

The Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple The Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary **Candlemass**

Many church people will have celebrated this three in one festival of Jesus and His Mother the previous Sunday but twenty two fellow travellers in the Stratton Deanery gathered in the ancient Poundstock Gildhouse to mark the day itself - Thursday February 2nd!

Sitting in a circle prayers were said and the 'Light to Lighten' was lit in our midst. After 'Grace' we enjoyed a delicious meal with two kinds of soup (with croutons!) crusty bread - a huge variety of cheese and fruit. The lunch was free and donated by the Worship & Spirituality group members but the Collection for Christian Aid's work with refugees amounted to £145 - so thank you for everyone's generosity!

After lunch we gathered round the Christ Light again and shared stories about Candlemass in Spain and France, about Snowdrops - the Candlemass Bell - about Hanukkah and Diwali and of course St Luke's account of this special day. We sang a metrical version of the Nunc Dimittis and then spent time thinking in the quietness about darkness and light. The darkest moments of our lives and how the Light of Christ had helped to dispel them. Then we thought about things that we hoped we might be able to shed the Light of Christ on in the year between now and next Candlemass. On a card 'leaf' each of us was invited to write a word or phrase reflecting that hope.

May the Light of Christ shine on our....Involvement....our Church membership....our witness to Christ....all our joys....our Guardian Angels....our trust in God and one another....our Listening....those who have been so tremendously kind....healing for those we love....those who are lonely....those who are housebound.....our desire to spread the love of Jesus.....Trump....all that challenges negative stereotypes of Christianity....those sitting in darkness....our Hope our Hope our HopePEACE for all people....Syria....our prayers....the future of our Church....

These and all are hopes were placed around the Light of Christ shining in our midst and we each received a small packet of Sunflower seeds (with instructions as how to best grow them!) Like the prayers that we offered up

to the Light of Christ they need planting, tending and constant attention if they are to grow to their full stature.

After our prayers we set off up the wet and very windy path for church! The challenge was to keep the Light of Christ burning as we ventured out into Gods world! Of course we all failed - but when we passed through the porch and into the Church the Light of Christ was there to greet us and rekindle our flames. Standing round the font, the place of baptism, we turned our thoughts to Lent, Holy week and the Cross. Extinguishing our own flames, but in the Light of Christ burning by the font, the Pascal Candle, we affirmed our Baptism commitment signing one another with the sign of the Cross on our foreheads with Holy Water.

Then, with the light of Christ burning in our hearts, back to the Gildhouse for tea (and Angela's delicious cakes!) and onward on our Journey with Jesus.

Persecuted Christians in Bangladesh

March 2017

Bangladesh has a population of around 170 million, 90% being Muslim and only 1% being Christian. It is a very poor country subject to frequent flooding during the monsoon season and to rising sea levels which pollute the very low lying coastal parts of the country.

While the constitution declares that Islam is the state religion, that same constitution states that the country is a secular country, including freedom of religion, and the country does not have any blasphemy laws or anti-conversion laws.

Sadly the government comes under a lot of pressure from Islamic extremists, and as in many Muslim countries of the world today there is increasing pressure to introduce Sharia law for all. Added to this there is an increase in violence against Christians, especially recent converts from Islam, and often directed at pastors and church workers. Following a spate of these attacks the government declared war on radical groups, but often turns a blind eye to what is happening.

Much of the persecution, especially in rural areas where there is little or no police presence, comes from families, local village groups and local religious leaders. In spite of the increasing numbers who have been killed or assaulted, there is a steady growth in converts to Christianity, which may be a reflection in the increase of violence.

Prayers:

Give thanks to God for the growth of the church in Bangladesh.

Pray for opportunities for believers to meet and worship and have fellowship without fear.

Pray to God for Christians as they go about their lives for protection from radical groups. Pray that Christian converts will not face discrimination in school, work or at home because of their faith.

Pray for peace in the country and for wisdom for the secular government to know how to effectively quell Islamist uprisings.

Pray for the police to be more effective in protecting Christians, and in bringing protagonists to justice.

Pray that those who plot and carry out persecution of Christians will come to know Jesus as their Saviour and see the error of their ways.

THE CHURCH YEAR: Thoughts for March

The month begins with Ash Wednesday. All over the country people the day before made pancakes. This originally meant that you used up all the eggs and butter in preparation for the austerities of Lent. How wonderful if all the people that ate pancakes came the following day to begin the period of Lent.

Lent is the part of the Church year when as disciples of Jesus we are expected to 'fast and pray' prior to the Easter celebrations. We fast from something that we love eating in order to discipline our bodies. We spend time in reading and thinking to help us to grow in our spiritual lives nearer to the example set by our Lord.

This year we are being challenged to look at prayer which gives us a chance to listen to others and share how we pray. The only way we gain knowledge is by being willing to listen. At school they did not give you a book and tell you to go away and read it. They made you sit and listen. We are so lucky that there are young people that are probably following the teaching of Jesus without realizing it and possibly better than we who are blinkered into thinking that we have all the answers.

Prayer:

O Lord may we progress in our knowledge of Thy love. Help us to see where in our ordinary lives we may be used to do your work. Help us to accept suffering and loneliness in the knowledge that we are walking with you. May we die to 'self'. Take us, break us and remake us, so that we may live and work to Thy glory.
